Director's Message

Starting out this Director's Message, it is cool and hinting of the fall to come. The hot, humid and wet weather will soon end, and perhaps I can mow my lawn before it needs to be harvested. With the school year starting we will soon have tour groups back to Magnolia Grange, the Museum and the Jail, and something new this year, an outreach program offered to the schools from our Society. Outreach programs have long been a subject and personal goal of mine and I believe that this effort will further allow our rich Chesterfield history to reach into the lives of our students. So if you are a teacher, or know one, please pass the word to call me at 777-9663 to set up a program this fall.

Thanks in part to a \$2,500 grant from Capital One, which funded most of our Summer Reading program, some 409 children and adults were able to go to nine library and one school site programs this summer. The people experienced life in 1700 Chesterfield County, with games, clothing and small personal items making a living history experience for young and old alike. Many thanks to Mike Steen for his time travelling efforts as well as Russell Harris for the grant writing. This program has also paid for a new school brochure made jointly with the Henricus Foundation, Chesterfield County Public Affairs and the Society. By the time you read this, the new brochure will be distributed to all the schoolteachers in the county and to other nearby locations.

Our 1999 internal audit is also now nearly finished and the delayed Annual Report will soon follow. I would like to thank the many people who have worked with us to complete these vital tasks. Of special note is David Brown, our treasurer; Jan Suttentfield, who is the key staff contact; Nancy Carter Crump, who has always provided information at each of my calls; Greg Goodwyn, a county summer intern with internal audit; as well as our auditors, Tasha Mason and Sara Sullivan, who have made great efforts to aid us in maintaining a high standard of museum conduct in funds management. An overview of the Chesterfield Historical Society of Virginia's 1999 financial report is in this issue of The Messenger.

We have some fall and winter events coming soon. In October come to Castlewood and join us for the 2nd CHS "Spirit Walk" from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on October 27 and 28. Chesterfield's ghostly spirits will join us for an enjoyable family Halloween event. A donation of \$5.00 provides some scares, a bit of history, a peek at Castlewood and the Jail at their gloomiest, and some light refreshments. cont'd page 9

CEMETERY COMMITTEE TAKES ON DEATH CERTIFICATE INDEXING PROJECT

Members of the Cemetery Committee, for several months now, have been sorting through early 20th century Virginia death certificates. These certificates are available to researchers at the Library of Virginia. The certificates span the years 1912 through 1939. The Cemetery Committee is indexing those certificates which indicate that a person is interred within the historical boundaries of Chesterfield County. Burials in public cemeteries such as Maury, Mt. Olivet, and Sunset are not included since they have kept their own records.

Much information of genealogical interest is to be learned from these certificates. A typical death certificate will contain the name, age, race and date of death for the deceased. Other important information includes the name of the deceased's parents - including mother's maiden name, if known; cause of death; place of birth, death and interment.

Every family historian knows how difficult it can be to find death dates for ancestors. This is especially true if the ancestor is not interred in a public cemetery. These death certificates can be very helpful in that regard. They are particularly important to the Cemetery Committee because they bring to light many old burying grounds previously not known.

The index will be set up both alphabetically by the last name of the deceased and by the place of interment. Information in the finished index will include name, death date, age, race, place of burial, the reel and death certificate numbers, and some miscellaneous information. Parents' names of children born between census years will be included. The project is expected to be finished by year's end and made available to the public by mid- 2001. It should contain approximately 5,000 names.

The Cemetery Committee has been hard at work on this project since mid-1999. They are cheerfully assisted by Mrs. Anne White, of the Local History Room, Central Library and Miss Whitney Moshier, an eighth grader at Salem Middle School.

MANAKIN HUGUENOTS' 300TH ANNIVERSARY - YOU'RE INVITED!

Before there was Richmond and before there was Chesterfield there was Manakintowne, and many of you drive through it every day. The descendants of the Manakin Huguenot colony are having a 300th anniversary celebration and they would love for you to come.

The original colony was settled on land grants given to French Protestants by William of Orange, after he became king of England. The Huguenots had fled religious persecution in France, and the colony was intended to be an outpost of French culture and Protestant religion.

The festivities begin on October 21, 2000 with an open house from 2-5 p.m. at Manakin Huguenot Society Headquarters, 981 Huguenot Trail. There will be living history interpreters to show what life must have been like for these middle class craftsmen and bureaucrats who fled their jewelry guilds, weaving shops, and professional offices to farm in the wilderness. The Monacan Indians had first cleared the site, and there will be information about them. A 1895 church, which incorporates parts of earlier churches, will be open for tours. The Manakin Episcopal Church, still in existence, has a modern facility next door.

Huguenot descendants abound in the area, and you can check to see if you are a cousin. The web page at <http://www.huguenot-manakin.org/> will get you started. There is a list of the founders' surnames. The Huguenots had an influence on Virginia's sense of design and on culture that lasts to this day. Distinguished descendants of the colony's founders include George Washington and Davy Crockett, along with Matthew Fontaine Maury whose charting of ocean currents, tides and winds revolutionized navigation.

At 4 p.m. there will be a special tour at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, which has wonderful examples of work by goldsmiths and silversmiths of Huguenot descent. These include Paul Revere, Paul deLamerie and Faberge'. These are beautiful pieces with wonderful stories, but you must reserve a spot.

In the evening at 7 p.m., there will be an anniversary banquet at the Virginia Historical Society, and the building will be open for tours of exhibits, including special Manakin pieces. Huguenot descendants are coming from all over the country, so seats are limited, but you may obtain invitations and more information by contacting Lucille Moseley at (804)794-5907. We'd love to see you!

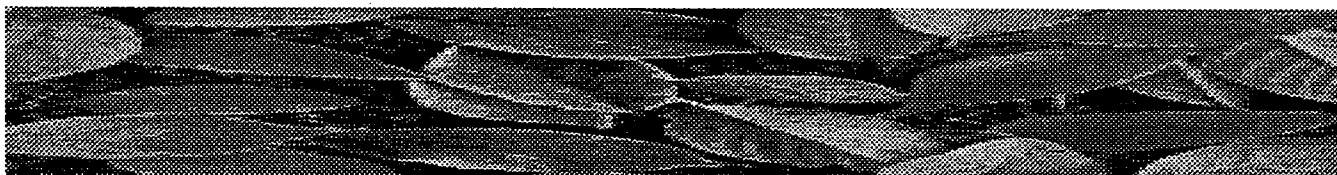
President's Message by Rebecca Badger

Veteran's Wall

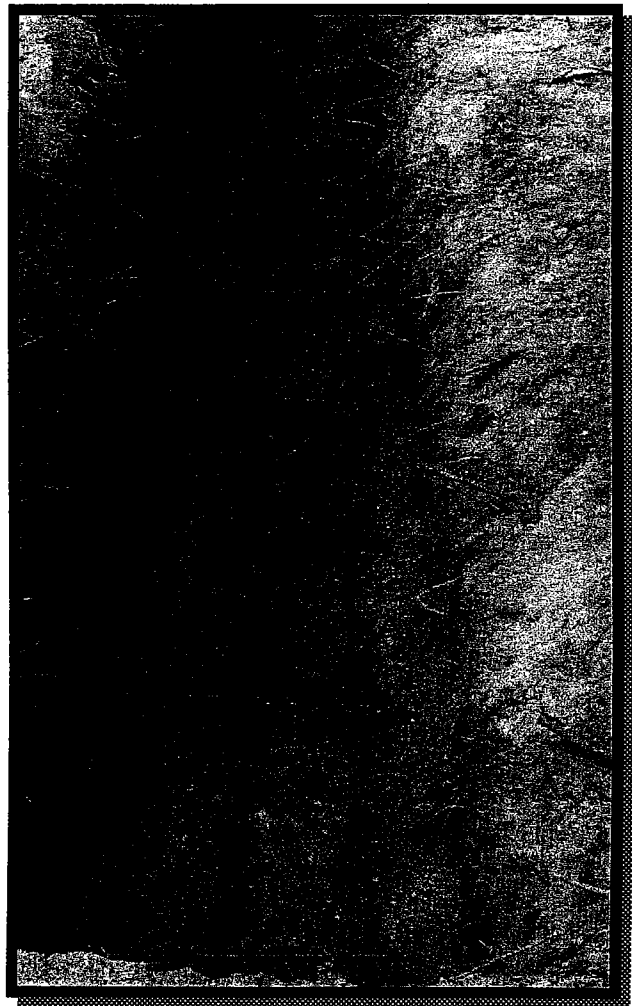

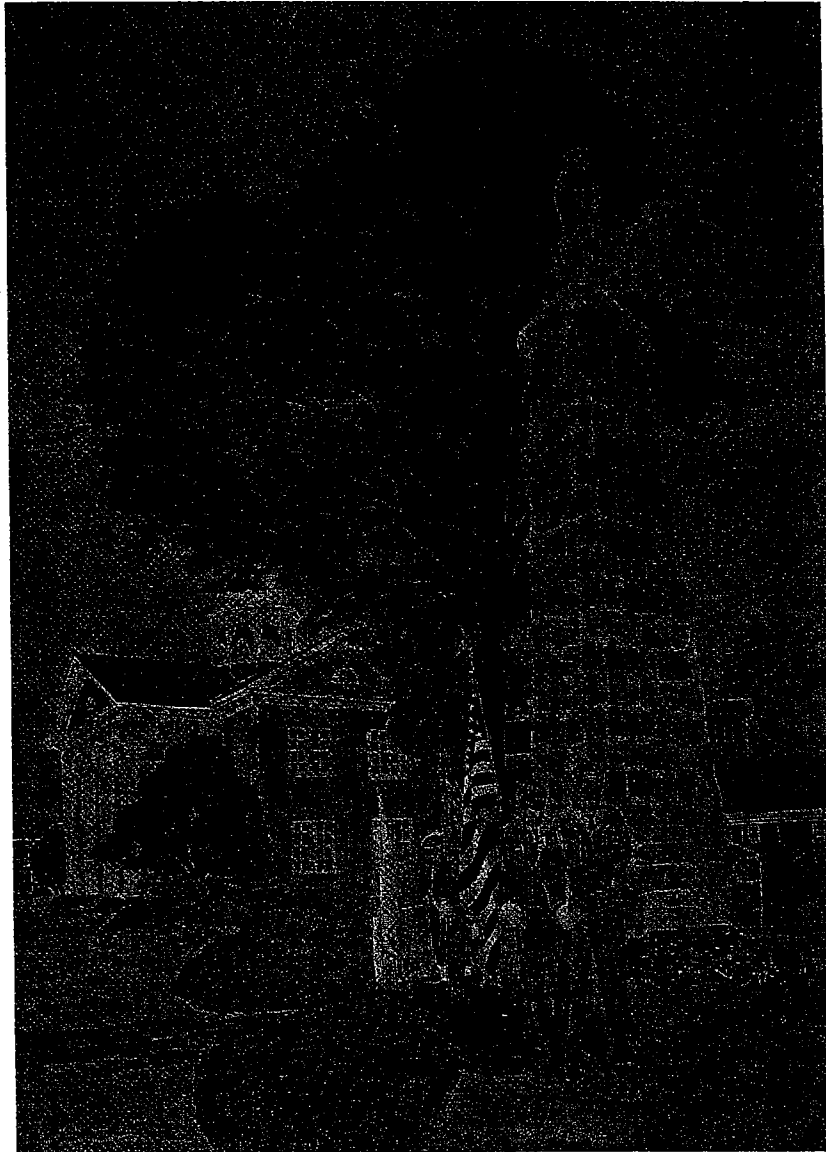
